This year's Summer Conference will be held in Plains, MT from June 11th-13th to be held in conjunction with the Western Bison Association.

The highlight of the Summer Conference will include several ranch tours of local MBA producers and a guided tour of the National Bison Range. The central point of our Conference will be the Sander's County Fairgrounds in Plains, MT. Activities will kick off Friday morning at the Fairgrounds with several guest speakers. As t This bill looked to redefine Wild Bison, delineate Wild Bison vs. Domestic, and Wild Bison movement and relocation. No other bills have caused the Board any concern. We will continue to monitor what is happening in Helena throughout this legislative session and email with any immediate concerns.

Additionally, you will find the proposed by-law changes first shared in December. Please review the changes and reach out to a Board member if you should have any questions in regards to the proposals. In the following weeks you will receive a paper ballot through the USPS. The ballot will also include instructions and timelines for returning the ballot.

We have also included a list of all current members. We want to welcome several new members Pam Fromhertz, Terye Gaustad, Mimi Hillenbrand, and Larry Martin.

The Board would like to welcome Chris Bechtold as the newest Board Member. #### PROPOSED REVISIONS TO THE MONTANA BISON ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS

The Board of Directors proposes to the membership, the following changes to the By-Laws of the Organization. These changes are being suggested to either clarify, update or improve conditions for the workings of the Association.

A summary of the proposed revisions are as follows:

- 1. Article 1, Section 1.2 Offices. The position of Treasurer is being shown separately.
- 2. Article's 2.1& 3.1, All references to the term "buffalo" have been replaced with the term "bison". This is being done to update the By-Laws.
- 3. Section 3.1 New Associate and Industry Memberships have been proposed.
- 4. Section's 3.2, 3.3 & 3.5 the position of Treasurer is being shown separately.
- 5. Section 4.2 Revised to clarify that payment of membership dues are due by January 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.

- 6. Section 4.3 Revised to clarify default provisions for membership dues not paid.
- 7. Section 5.1 New language is being proposed (last two paragraphs) in the event the annual meeting should have to be delayed in handling replacement director positions.
- 8. Section 6.2, Revised to clarify that only one person from each family, ranch or organization may be considered for office.
- 9. Section 7.1, Revised and updated language to clarify director positions that are to be replaced annually.
- 10. Section 11.2, Revised to show the fiscal year to run from January 1 thru December 31 of each year.
- 11. Section 11.3, Revised and updated to reflect latest language for completing financial audits of the organization.



## **USDA Approves \$17 Million Purchase of Bison Meat**From The National Bison Association

WESTMINSTER, CO (Dec. 4, 2020) – Bison business leaders hailed today's announcement from U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) that the agency had approved the National Bison Association's request for a \$17 million purchase of ground bison under the Section 32 Surplus Removal program.

The association filed the request for the Section 32 purchase in late August, noting that market pressures created by an unanticipated large crop of harvest-ready bison in 2019 was compounded by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. The purchase of bison meat is part of a \$170 million Section 32 purchase that also included beans, butter, fluid milk and fresh grapes.

"Today's announcement helps place a foundation of stability under the bison business. That foundation will enable us to rebuild the strength and profitability that our business has enjoyed over the past decade," said Dave Carter, executive director of the National Bison Association.

Carter thanked the USDA personnel who had carefully weighed the economic information submitted by the bison association. He also thanked the 12 U.S. Senators, led by Sens. John Hoeven (R-ND) and Michael Bennet (D-CO) who weighed in with the USDA on behalf of the bison industry request.

"Individual bison ranchers who took the time to contact their congressional offices to push for this purchase deserve a lot of the credit for making this happen," he added.

Today's announcement binds the agency to buy up to \$17 million in bison meat, with the actual purchases dependent upon the number of bids submitted by qualified suppliers.

While the USDA purchases will be made from commercial processors, Carter noted that the purchase of bison meat will benefit everyone along the supply chain.

"We are just getting into the major auction season for live bison. This announcement provides buyers and sellers with a degree of confidence in the economic outlook of our business," he said.

# Challenge Grants Fuel Opportunities to Double Support for Bison Center of Excellence

People wanting to support the newly-chartered Center of Excellence(COE) for Bison Studies now have an opportunity to double the value of their contribution, thanks to two generous donors committing challenge grants to support fundraising efforts last week.



The Center of Excellence was formally launched in September 2020 as a partnership between South Dakota State University, the National Bison Association and the National Buffalo Foundation. The Center of Excellence for Bison Studies is headquartered at SDSU's West River Research and Extension facility in Rapid City.

Following a presentation on the Center's activities at the National Bison Association Winter Conference last week, an anonymous donor offered to match up to \$50,000 in new donations in support of the Center. Immediately after that announcement, John Flocchini of the Durham Ranch in Wyoming announced that the ranch would match the \$50,000 commitment and would pledge an additional \$50,000 as a new challenge grant. Conference participants stepped up with pledges of \$23,000 toward that second \$50,000 challenge.

The next \$27,000 in pledges will continue to be matched by the Durham Ranch. Those pledges can be submitted to the National Buffalo Foundation, a public 501(c) (3) organization <a href="https://www.nationalbuffalofoundation.org/donate/">www.nationalbuffalofoundation.org/donate/</a>

National Bison Association Executive Director Dave Carter said, "This grassroots commitment from individual bison producers demonstrates the strong commitment our members are making to support new research that will strengthen the health of our herds and the land, and that will help us continue to connect the public with deliciously healthy bison meat."

COE Director Dr. Kristi Cammack said, "the commitment made by the bison community today will go a long way to supporting the type of research and outreach that will benefit everyone in our business, and the customers who rely on us for high quality, nutritious products."

The 2018 U.S. Farm Bill authorizes the USDA's National Institute for Food and Agriculture to recognize centers of excellence in research, extension and education in the food and agricultural sciences. The Center of Excellence for Bison Studies is coordinated through SDSU, but will include active participation by researchers and extension officials from other land grant universities, including 1994 tribal landgrant colleges and universities.

The Center focuses on research activities to improve bison herd health and the economic viability of both private and tribal bison producers.

# Prairie Reserve's bison get clean bill of health, fresh start with Phillips County

This month, American Prairie Reserve shared with the Phillips County Conservation District that, as before, our bison herd has been given a clean bill of health.

As Senior Bison Restoration Manager for American Prairie, I am one of several members of our team that's living and working in Phillips County, supporting the day-to-day management of the bison herds that graze on our properties. The health of our herds is just as important to us as it is to our neighbors in Phillips County.

Earlier this year, an adjustment board appointed by the state Department of Natural Resources and Conservation unanimously approved a new bison grazing and disease management



agreement between our team and the Phillips County Conservation District. I can say first-hand that this agreement was the hard-won result of many months of constructive and respectful talks from parties who ultimately found common ground.

American Prairie was given a 10-year variance from the county's bison grazing ordinance. In exchange, we agreed to expand our already-robust disease management program, and routinely share that information with the Conservation District board.

Our team is dedicated to creating a refuge for wildlife and people. We want for all Montanans to have access to our state's incredible grasslands for generations to come, while also conserving one of the world's last prairie landscapes that can be protected on an ecosystem-scale. This includes bison, which are crucial to that ecosystem.


As of our last count, we have 810 bison in our herd. We source from herds that have been brucellosis-free for several decades. We meet or exceed all Montana Department of Livestock testing, vaccination, and quarantine requirements for every animal before it arrives on American Prairie property.

Our team is also dedicated to being good community-members. Fulfilling the terms of this new agreement with Phillips County comes at a significant operational cost to us, but it's important to us that our neighbors' concerns are heard.

In January, as soon as the agreement was finalized, a group of several employees and volunteers immediately got to work to implement the expanded disease testing requirements. We moved 136 animals through a carefully-designed series of corrals and chutes. Of that total, 97 bison were disease tested, 42 hair samples were taken for DNA testing, 94 LORa GPS Tags were deployed, and three GPS tracking collars were deployed. We were very glad to have more than 20 people from the community and Conservation District join us to observe the handling.

## Groups raising funds for new bison quarantine facility in YellowstoneB

Two conservation groups are attempting to raise \$500,000 by June to help pay for modifying and building new quarantine pens near Yellowstone National Park so more bison can be transferred to tribes and avoid slaughter.

"We're a little over halfway to our goal," said Scott Christensen, executive director of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition.

The coalition pledged to raise \$250,000. <u>Yellowstone Forever</u>, the park's fundraising arm, is pursuing another \$250,000.

"This is one of the park's highest priorities," said Lisa Diekmann, president and CEO of Yellowstone Forever, who added that her group is also more than halfway toward its goal. "I think in some ways bison are even more iconic than other Yellowstone wildlife. Hopefully, our constituents love them as well."

The Park Service will provide another \$500,000 to fund the million-dollar project. Construction could start this summer with a goal to have the expanded facilities available by next winter, according to Chris Geremia, the park's lead bison biologist.

"We've shown this can work on a smaller scale," said Cam Sholly, superintendent of Yellowstone National Park.

The new facilities will require an increase in park personnel to oversee their operation, as well.

"There's still a lot to be done, but this is a step in the right direction," Sholly said.

In a nod to the new effort, the park is now referring to the quarantine program as its Bison Conservation Transfer Program.

"It's an indication of how important bison are, not only in Yellowstone but far beyond," Sholly said. "Ultimately, I'd like to set a longer-term goal of not consigning Yellowstone bison to slaughter."
